The Fifty-first annual Cactus Fly-In is now in the history books. Two days of picture perfect weather led to a record turnout of display aircraft and grass roots aviation enthusiasts. Absent this year were the very old pre-1935 antiques but there was no shortage of planes to enjoy. Three Electra 12A's from as far away as Georgia flew in to park side by side. The back row of big iron had some rare birds: Goodyear Super Corsair, Douglas AD-1 Skyraider, Grumman Albatross, P-51D, Bamboo Bomber as well as many other rare planes. This year's Fly In also had a record turnout of ten Ercoupes which are experiencing a groundswell of restorations since most are Sport Pilot legal. One of the owners said there are more Ercoupes flying today than ten years ago.

The Grand Champion award went to an Electra 12A from Chino, California. Chapter 1217 members bringing home trophies were Bernie Gross who won People's Choice with his replica German Storch, Stu Bloemer who won Best Homebuilt with his Texas Sport Cub and Curtis Clark for Best Piper with his J-3 Cub.

Chapter 1217 members showed up in mass to help with the running of the show for the Antiquers. With the contributions of the local Casa Grande EAA Chapter 1445 we supplied 98% of the manpower to keep this event growing. A big thanks goes out to each of you that came down and donated your time. This year we actually had more volunteers that shifts to use them. This is a good thing! APA CHAPMAN RANCH FLY IN

Nancy Benscoter reports that this year's Arizona Pilots Association Chapman Ranch Fly-In is April 11, 2009. Through the APA's efforts Chapman Ranch now has an official FAA identifier, 58 AZ. This identifier will be listed on the new chart publications. Please visit the APA's web site <u>www.azpilots.org</u> for airstrip coordinates and safety guidelines.

The APA needs everyone to give the Chapman Ranch Fly-In the up most attention in getting the word out to help keep this airstrip open. Participation (that means eating breakfast at the Chapman Ranch Fly-In) and/or monetary donations to their 501C3 organization for this airstrip are needed to continue operations of Chapman Ranch Airstrip. There are some rules for operating at this airport so please visit the APA website and review the conditions and procedures. It also might be a good idea to break out the performance data for your plane and figure out the maximum load and temperature you can safely operate at this airport BEFORE you takeoff!

RS WARBIRDS OPENING AT DEER VALLEY

The former BankOne 11,000 square foot hangar at the south east corner of the airport has been leased after being vacant since January 2008. This was the location of Advantage Avionics that was in operation for only a few months. The new owners are Tom Rowe and Mike Smith who will be operating under the name of "RS Warbirds." The new business could employ upwards of 20 people. The company plans to offer L-39 jet trainer maintenance and is also rebuilding five Shorts Tucano turboprop trainers.

EMERGENCY TOOL KIT

By Brian Lee EAA Chapter 441, Kent, WA Recently, I found myself stranded at an airport with an engine that would not start...and me without any tools. I do have an "airport" tool bag packed and ready for those times when I'm going to work on the airplane, but at 25 pounds, I don't carry it along if I'm just going on a short flight. After trying to undo safety wire with my fingernails and a pocket knife, I resolved to assemble a small number of "essential" tools that I will leave in my flight bag—so they're always be available when I am flying. I sat down and deliberately considered what the bare essential list of "what it takes to get home" items might be, then assembled a kit. Your list might be different, and you might argue about the "essential" nature of some of it, but it works for me. Here's my list:

- 4-in-one screwdriver
- adjustable pliers
- adjustable wrench (which will open wide enough to fit spark plug caps) (mine is attached to a Leatherman tool)
- spark plug wrench (deep well socket and breaker-I chose a slider rather than a ratchet for weight considerations)
- wire cutter
- safety wire pliers
- magnifying inspection mirror
- magnetic pick-up tool
- awl/dental pick
- small file
- small flat blade screwdriver
- hex wrenches: 5/32" for avionics; 0.05" for setscrews on knobs
- assortment of #8 and #10 screws, nuts, and washers
- assortment of cotter pins
- assortment of zip ties
- safety wire
- electrical tape

(and, yes, there's part of a roll of duct tape which lives in the baggage compartment).

I dug around in the basement and found a scrap of canvas which my wife had left over from another project, spent a couple of hours with her sewing machine, and the result is a convenient if not pretty kit which fits neatly in the side pocket of my flight bag. At 3-1/4 pounds, it does add a bit of weight, but the peace of mind is worth the extra weight.
